LEADER Bible Study

The Ammonites were no strangers to the Israelites. They often fought over the region of Gilead, which stretched east of the Jordan River. David had tried showing kindness to the Ammonites, but they humiliated the Israelite ambassadors. (See 2 Sam. 10:1-5.) Thus began a war between the Israelites and Ammonites. This context sets the scene for the story of David's sin and restoration.

David had experienced a season of blessing from God and success on the battlefield. The tribes of Israel united under David. But the upward trajectory of David's life did not continue much longer.

One evening, David looked from his rooftop and saw Bathsheba bathing. He found out that she was the wife of Uriah, one of David's elite soldiers. Her married status alone made her off-limits to David, but he nevertheless called for her and slept with her. David probably assumed his sin would go unnoticed, until Bathsheba told him she was pregnant. With Uriah gone to war, it was obvious the baby was not her husband's.

David called Uriah home from the battle and encouraged him to be with his wife. But Uriah refused. Uriah didn't think it was fair for him to be with his wife while other men were at war. So David instructed his army commander to position Uriah in the most violent part of the battle so he would be killed. This time, David's plan worked. Uriah was killed, and David took Bathsheba as his wife.

God knew David's sin and sent Nathan the prophet to confront David. David's confession is recorded in Psalm 51. God wanted David's heart to change so he would not want to sin again. God forgave David, but David still faced the consequences of his sin.

Like David, we need more than a changed lifestyle to be made right with God; we need new hearts. Jesus died to satisfy God's wrath against sin so that we could be made alive in Him.

The BIBLE Story

David Sinned and Was Restored

2 Samuel 11–12; Psalm 51

David was the king of Israel. One spring, David sent out the army, but he put another man in charge of them. David stayed in Jerusalem.

One evening, David looked out from his palace and saw a beautiful woman named Bathsheba.


Bathsheba was the wife of Uriah, one of the best warriors in David's army.

David sent his messengers to get Bathsheba, and she came to David's house. Later, Bathsheba told David that she was going to have a baby; the baby would be David's.

David knew what he had done was wrong. David should not have a baby with someone who was not his wife. So David made a plan to make sure no one found out that Bathsheba's baby was his.

David called Uriah home from the battle and told him to spend time with his wife. But Uriah didn't think it was fair for him to relax at home while the other men were at war. He slept on David's doorstep and refused to visit his wife.

So David made up another plan. He instructed Joab, the leader of the army, to send Uriah into the hardest part of the battle so he



would be killed. This time, David's plan worked. Uriah was killed in battle. **David took Bathsheba into his house to be his wife, and she had a baby boy.**

God knew what David had done, and He was not happy with David. God sent Nathan the prophet to talk to David. Nathan told David a story: A traveler came to a rich man who had many animals. The rich man did not offer his own animal. Instead, he took a poor man's lamb—the only lamb he had—and gave it to the traveler to eat.

This story made David feel angry. "The rich man should die!" David said.

"You are the man!" Nathan said. **God had given David a position of great power, and David took what wasn't his. David realized he had sinned against God. David deserved to die.** "You won't die for this," Nathan assured David, "but God will punish you. Your son will die instead."

David confessed his sin and prayed, "God, create a clean heart for me." David realized he could try to please God with sacrifices, but that wouldn't be enough to pay for his sin. **God wanted David's heart to change so that he would not want to sin again.**

Christ Connection: When David sinned against God, God forgave him, but sin always comes with a price. God spared David's life, but David's son died. When we sin, we deserve death. But we can receive God's forgiveness because God sent His Son, Jesus, to pay the price for our sin.

INTRODUCE the Story



SESSION TITLE: David Sinned and Was Restored **Opening Activities**

BIBLE PASSAGE: 2 Samuel 11–12; Psalm 51

STORY POINT: David repented and God forgave him.

KEY PASSAGE: Psalm 145:13

BIG PICTURE QUESTION: How is Jesus the Perfect King? Jesus perfectly rules over the universe as the King of kings.

Intro Music

Welcome time

Play intro music and greet each kid as he or she arrives. Help new kids connect to your group. Prompt kids to talk about a time they tried to cover up a mistake or wrong choice.

SAY • When we bad things, sometimes we try to hide those choices. When we disobey God, that's called sin. We often think that our sin won't be a problem if we keep others from finding out about it. But today we will learn that sin is always a problem because we can never hide our sin from God.

Activity page (5 minutes)

Invite kids to complete the “Restore It” activity page. Challenge kids to draw a version of each item after it has been fully fixed and restored.

SAY • Our sin has broken the world. It destroys our relationships with God and with other people. We cannot fix the damage sin causes, but God can forgive and restore us when we trust Him. Today we will learn about a time David sinned and was restored.

Session starter (10 minutes)

OPTION 1: Thief!

Invite the kids to sit in a circle. Place a chair in the center of the circle and select one kid to sit in the chair. Place a paper wad, or other small object under the chair. Instruct the kid on the chair to close his eyes. While the kid in the chair has his eyes closed, silently select a second kid to sneak to the center and take the item under the chair. She should hide the object in her hand, and all the kids should pretend they are holding the button. The kid in the chair will then open his eyes and try to guess who stole the item. Play multiple rounds, rotating kids through the roles.

SAY • In the game, taking the item wasn't really the same as stealing something. Today we will learn about a time King David really did steal from another man. What do you think David did to cover up his sin?

Large Group Game

LEADER • Everyone stand up and move to the middle of the room. Ok, on this wall we have the word “TRUE” and on this wall we have “FALSE”. I am going to give you a True or False trivia question and you all are going to pick which one you think is the right answer by running to either this wall or that one. Then I will tell you the correct answer and if you got it right, you get to keep playing! If you got it wrong, you sit down and are out of the game. We will play this over and over until there is one winner. Got it? Let’s play True False Run!

LEADER • Great job everyone! Let’s sing praises now to Jesus for being our perfect, everlasting King of kings.

Introduce the session

[*Leader enters obviously flustered.*]

LEADER • Ooo, that just makes me so mad! I can't believe he would do that. [Pause to address kids.] Hey there, friends. I'm sorry you caught me so upset. I have a friend that I play Pokemon with and right now, he is making me very angry.

You see, my friend has a TON of Pokemon cards - like enough to fill up his entire closet! I only have a few - like enough to fill this tiny folder. Anyway, yesterday he came over and asked if he could borrow my cards for something important. I didn't want to be selfish with my stuff so I told him yes and he took my cards and left. But then when he returned them, they were all wet and ruined!

I asked him, "What happened to my cards?!" and he said that he took them to the pool to play Pokemon and they all fell in the water! I said, "Why didn't you use your own cards for that!" (remember, he has tons of them) and he said he didn't want to because he didn't want his cards to get wet and ruined - so he used mine! I'm just so upset that he would be so selfish. But actually ... You know, if I look on the bright side, one good thing that can come out of this frustrating situation is a great tie-in to our Bible story this week. Our story is about a time David made some really selfish, sinful choices. I'll share it with you; then I can share it with my friend.

Big picture question

LEADER • Remember that we have been answering the big picture question, *how is Jesus the perfect King? Jesus perfectly rules over the universe as the King of kings*. That means that Jesus has both the ability and the authority to do what He wants, and what He wants to do is always perfectly good and right. When we trust in and love Jesus, we will want to obey Him. Obeying Him is what is best for everyone.

LEADER • We are learning about king David. **God chose**

David to be king instead of Saul. Saul was jealous and angry about this, and he tried to kill David.

David showed mercy even though Saul hated him. After Saul died, David became the king. **God promised that the Messiah would come from David's family.** Later, **David showed kindness to**

Jonathan's son, even though he did not have to.

After all these stories, it may seem like David—who was a great king—never made any mistakes. But let me assure you, only Jesus is perfect. Our story today is called “David Sinned and Was Restored.”

Watch the Bible story

Show the Bible story video “David Sinned and Was Restored.”

LEADER • As you can see, David was far from perfect.

When David tried to cover up his sin with Bathsheba, it led only to more sin—eventually, even to the killing of Uriah, Bathsheba's husband. It is very scary to think about other people knowing the sinful things we do, but trying to cover up our sin is never the wise choice. **David repented and God forgave him.**

In a way, we can think about sin as being darkness. Imagine a room that is completely dark, with no light at all. You wouldn't be able to see anything, so you might stumble, fall, or hurt yourself. You cannot get rid of a dark room by covering it with more darkness; the only way to get rid of a dark room is to shine light into it. Then it won't be dark anymore!

Jesus said that He is the light of the world. [See *John 8:12*.] That helps us understand that only Jesus can get rid of sin.

When Jesus enters into a sinner's life, He lights it up, forcing out sin. Even after we have faith in Jesus, we still make sinful choices sometimes. That's kind of like trying to cover up the sun with your hand; it may cast a shadow, but it doesn't remove the light. When we confess our sin, it's like moving your hand away so the sun can shine warmly on your face again. Sin always has consequences, but Jesus rescues us from the punishment we deserve.

Christ connection

LEADER • When David sinned against God and repented, God forgave him; but sin always comes with a price. God spared David's life, but David's son died. When we sin, we deserve death. But we can receive God's forgiveness because God sent His Son, Jesus, to pay the price for our sin.

Note: You may use this opportunity to use Scripture and the guide provided to explain how to become a Christian. Make sure kids know when and where they can ask questions.



Missions moment

Show the "Mudding in Mozambique" missions video.

LEADER • We have been learning about the African country of Mozambique. We have also been hearing from the Harrell family. They have been missionaries in this country for a long time but are only now seeing people choose to put their trust in Jesus, the perfect King. The new people joining God's church often build places to meet. Their church building is very different from ours, but they worship King Jesus just like us. ***How is Jesus the perfect King? Jesus perfectly rules over the universe as the King of kings.***

Show the key passage slide. Open the Bible and lead the boys and girls to read together Psalm 145:13.

LEADER • David wrote Psalm 145. David was a great king—he was powerful and good. But as we saw today, David was not a perfect king. Jesus is our perfect King. *How is Jesus the perfect King? Jesus perfectly rules over the universe as the King of kings.* His kingdom will never end.

Pray

Invite kids to pray before dismissing to small groups.

LEADER • God, You are good and You love us. We cannot earn Your forgiveness, but You still forgive us. Help us to trust You each day. We want to obey You. God help us to share you with others. Amen.

Dismiss to apply the story

APPLY the Story



SESSION TITLE: David Sinned and Was Restored

Small Group

Activity choice

- Brown clay
- Pony beads
- Waxed paper

OPTION 1: Mud art

Provide each kid with a lump of brown clay. Help them form the clay into a cross shape. Give the kids the colorful beads to press into the clay as decoration. Give each kid a bit of waxed paper to place their cross on to dry and harden.

SAY • In Mozambique, some Christians build places to meet out of mud because mud is inexpensive and fairly easy to build with. When you see your cross, remember that no matter where you live or what kind of building you meet in, people all over the world worship King Jesus. *How is Jesus the perfect King? Jesus perfectly rules over the universe as the King of kings.* Remember to pray for the missionaries and people living in Mozambique.

- Construction paper
- scissors

OPTION 2: Broken hearts

Provide each kid with a sheet of construction paper. Help the kids fold their papers in half and draw the shape of half a heart centered on the crease. Then provide scissors for the kids to cut along their marking so that when they unfold the paper, it makes a heart. Task the kids with cutting their heart into about five or six irregular shapes. After this, kids should swap their heart puzzles with one another and try to reassemble them. You may provide tape for kids to hold their puzzles together.

SAY • Even after putting those hearts back together, they are

not fully restored. The damage of cutting them apart has already been done. **David repented and God forgave him**, but his sin still had consequences.

In our lives, when God repairs our hearts from the damage sin causes, it may feel like the restoration isn't complete. Sin hurts us and others. But one day, Jesus will return to earth as the perfect King. When he does, all sin will be removed and all brokenness will be fully and permanently fixed. ***How is Jesus the perfect King? Jesus perfectly rules over the universe as the King of kings.***

Reflection and prayer (5 minutes)

Distribute a sheet of paper to each child. Ask the kids to draw a picture to answer the following questions:

- What does this story teach me about God?
- What does this story teach me about myself?
- Who can I tell about this story?

Make sure to send the sheets home with kids alongside the activity page so that parents can see what their kids have been learning.

If time remains, take prayer requests or allow kids to complete the Bible story coloring page provided with this session. Pray for your group.
