Daniel 6 NIV

Daniel in the Den of Lions

6 It pleased Darius to appoint 120 satraps to rule throughout the kingdom, ² with three administrators over them, one of whom was Daniel. The satraps were made accountable to them so that the king might not suffer loss. ³ Now Daniel so distinguished himself among the administrators and the satraps by his exceptional qualities that the king planned to set him over the whole kingdom. ⁴ At this, the administrators and the satraps tried to find grounds for charges against Daniel in his conduct of government affairs, but they were unable to do so. They could find no corruption in him, because he was trustworthy and neither corrupt nor negligent. ⁵ Finally these men said, "We will never find any basis for charges against this man Daniel unless it has something to do with the law of his God."

⁶ So these administrators and satraps went as a group to the king and said: "May King Darius live forever! ⁷ The royal administrators, prefects, satraps, advisers and governors have all agreed that the king should issue an edict and enforce the decree that anyone who prays to any god or human being during the next thirty days, except to you, Your Majesty, shall be thrown into the lions' den. ⁸ Now, Your Majesty, issue the decree and put it in writing so that it cannot be altered—in accordance with the law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be repealed." ⁹ So King Darius put the decree in writing.

¹⁰ Now when Daniel learned that the decree had been published, he went home to his upstairs room where the windows opened toward Jerusalem. Three times a day he got down on his knees and prayed, giving thanks to his God, just as he had done before. ¹¹ Then these men went as a group and found Daniel praying and asking God for help. ¹² So they went to the king and spoke to him about his royal decree: "Did you not publish a decree that during the next thirty days anyone who prays to any god or human being except to you, Your Majesty, would be thrown into the lions' den?"

The king answered, "The decree stands—in accordance with the law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be repealed."

¹³ Then they said to the king, "Daniel, who is one of the exiles from Judah, pays no attention to you, Your Majesty, or to the decree you put in writing. He still prays three times a day." ¹⁴ When the king heard this, he was greatly distressed; he was determined to rescue Daniel and made every effort until sundown to save him.

¹⁵ Then the men went as a group to King Darius and said to him, "Remember, Your Majesty, that according to the law of the Medes and Persians no decree or edict that the king issues can be changed."

¹⁶ So the king gave the order, and they brought Daniel and threw him into the lions' den. The king said to Daniel, "May your God, whom you serve continually, rescue you!"

¹⁷ A stone was brought and placed over the mouth of the den, and the king sealed it with his own signet ring and with the rings of his nobles, so that Daniel's situation might not be changed. NOTES

TEACHING AND VIDEO HYBRID

THE WHAT

WHAT are we talking about and WHY does it matter to me? (2-4 min)

ME

• Ask a few friends and family members to answer this question for you – and share their answers with your students: What would you say I'm known for? What's my legacy?

WE

- We all have reputations. We will all leave a legacy.
- Most of us would agree that a good reputation is a good thing. But what happens when our enemies set out to destroy that reputation due to jealousy and pride?

TRANSITION

 In this final session, Sadie is going to wrap up this series in Daniel 6. We're going to learn why living a life of integrity might provoke our enemies but will always glorify God—which is what our lives are all about.

SO WHAT

So WHAT does this mean for my faith and life with God? (6-8 min)

GOD

- Before viewing the session, here are a few important things to look for in Sadie's teaching. As you watch, pay attention to how she answers the following questions.
 - According to Sadie, what is the theme of this session?
 - In what ways is King Darius different from King Nebuchadnezzar? Why is this difference important to the story?
 - How did Darius feel about Daniel and God?

SO WHAT CONTINUED

JESUS CONNECTION

- Daniel is awesome, but Daniel isn't the hero of his story. God is the hero. God rescues and saves Daniel and his friends.
- Don't miss this: the same is true for us. We aren't the heroes of our story. God is the hero of our story and of our lives.
- God sent His son Jesus to rescue and save us from sin and death. We can only live faithful lives to God after we first put our faith in Jesus, in His loving grace.
- Once we take that first step, then we are called to a life of faithfulness. A life where we walk trusting God is faithful to us, even in the fire.

TRANSITION

- In this series, we've seen a remarkable example of faithful obedience from Daniel and his friends Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. We've learned that God is always in control. The positions we find ourselves in are part of his plan to influence and impact those around us through our confident display of obedience to his commands.
- So what does this all mean for us in our lives now?

NOW WHAT

NOW that I know, HOW can I live this out? (2-4 min)

YOU

- The journey of faithful obedience to God is going to be challenging. As Sadie stated, we live in a culture that hates God—and as believers, we have to stand firm in our faith knowing that the culture will try to pressure us into compromising.
- But as we learned in the book of Daniel, an uncompromising faith is worth it, and God is always on our side.

WE

• Like Daniel and his friends walked in their faith together, so can we! We can support each other to stand in fire and faithfulness.

PRAY

- Close your time together in prayer.
- Pray and ask God to give you courage and confidence to follow and obey Him, even in tough situations or over a long period of time.

DISCUSSION GUIDE

WEEK 4 -

JESUS CONNECTION:

Daniel is awesome, but he isn't the hero of the story: God is. God is the hero of our stories too.

LEADER CORNER

GOAL OF SMALL GROUP

For students to see that remaining faithful to God is worth it.

THINK ABOUT THIS

The world puts a lot of pressure on students on who they should become and that doesn't always line up with who God created us to be. One of the best things you can do as a leader is help students MOBILIZE THEIR FAITH by having a real, growing relationship with God where they trust Him over anyone or anything else.

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

This guide is a suggestion, not a formula. Adjust the questions and activities as needed, and don't feel like you need to do, or ask, everything you see here. Let the students and the Holy Spirit guide the conversation, too.

CONVERSATION GUIDE

- 1. What stood out to you from the video?

 - 5. How did you (or could you) choose to rely on God during this experience?
- READ DANIEL 6:16-28 and answer the following questions:
 - 6. What happens in these verses?
 - 7. What does Daniel's story show us about the power and impact of being obedient? How does his story show us that faithful obedience is worth it?
 - 8. In what ways have you found it easy or difficult to remain faithful to God amid danger or intimidation?
 - 9. It's easy to start something, but sometimes hard to follow through. The true can be said of walking in faithfully obedience to God over a period of time. What are ways we grow faithfulness in ourselves?
 - 10. How can we encourage each other in our small group to remain faithful?

NEXT STEPS
