WHY ARE QUESTIONS SO VITAL?

- 1. Questions help students think.
- 2. Questions help surface the question beneath the question.
- 3. Remember that God uses questions with us!
- 4. Know that questions bring clarity.

HOW DO WE BECOME BETTER QUESTION-ASKERS?

- 1. **Learn** from Jesus and Paul's example in Scripture.
- 2. Follow people who ask good questions.

"What do you think?"

"How did that make you feel?"

"Can you tell me more about that?"

EFFECTIVE DISCIPLESHIP is about being formed into the likeness of Christ, not simply about being informed about the life of Christ.

1. **(PEND TIME** with teenagers outside structured youth group meetings.

All different types of deposits, made over the course of time, will earn you the right to speak into the life of a teenager.



A FEW IDEAC

- Embracing Zoom and Facetime.
- Add everything to your calendar.
- Invite teenagers into the most ordinary parts of your life.
- 2. CHARE your own discipleship journey with them.
 - · Share your own experience first.
 - · Ask them for prayer.
 - · Tell them about what God is doing in your life right now.
