ABOUT THIS WEEK

Discussion Questions:

- How would you describe "radical love"? Have you seen it lived out?
- What are some of the things that get in the way of unity in churches or youth groups?
- What does it look like to fight for peace instead of being passive or divisive?
- How can our group become a place where outsiders feel like they belong?

Make it Real:

- Are there any relationships in your life that need healing? How can love and unity in that relationship prove to others that Jesus is real?

Prayer

- Share requests
- Pray for your group to be known for love and unity. Ask God to break down walls and strengthen the bond you have through Christ.

Discipleship Moment: Bridge Builder Challenge

Challenge students to reach out to someone they don't normally talk to at church or school. Invite them to come check out our small group, sit with them at lunch or simply ask how they're doing.
