All around you (all the time), messages similar to these pop onto the screens you scroll, bombard the ads in between the videos you watch, are plastered across the windows of the stores you shop, weave their way into the music you listen to, get amplified by the latest influencers on the scene, and dig deep into your subconscious mind.

Have you noticed the extreme value that our culture places on you? Think about it. You are the center of 99% of advertising campaigns. If you listen to the world around you, defining "you" may actually be the most important thing you'll ever do.

Listen to the right music. Why? It tells the world who you are. Wear the right clothes. Why? It shows the world how you express yourself. Make your version of this trending video. Why? Because people need to see you be you. Drink this, don't drink that. Say this, don't say that. Date this person, not that person. You do you. Be your authentic self. Live your truth. Weigh in this way about this thing on social media because doing so will show the world you are YOU.

YOU, YOU, YOU,

It's all about you. All about "I." All about the individual. You are your own brand. You are the manager and marketer of that brand. You are in control. You are in the driver's seat. You are the center of your own universe.

However, when Jesus rescued you—when you accepted the *Exchange* of death for life that He made possible for you through His death on the Cross—you accepted an *Exchange* of values. You accepted an *Exchange* of identity.

This new life you're living, this "exchanged life"? Yeah, well, the truth is that your identity has been exchanged. You are no longer the center of your world anymore.

The "you" has been exchanged for the "Him."


So, how do we respond to this *Exchange*? Glad you asked; let's explore that together!


GETTING STARTED

SESSION 4

Follow your leader's instructions to work through this activity. Then, work through the questions together as a group.

Students will use the space provided inside the mirror to write down a sentence, word, or phrase that describes, defines, or identifies them. In other words, it is something that they believe defines who they are. Another student will use the space provided inside the fingerprint to create a new identity for the student who owns this book by writing down a sentence, word, or phrase that describes and defines this new identity. This new identity can be anything (except mean or critical about their partner).

· What made this activity difficult?

Answers will vary but may include: They don't know me well enough to define me. I feel judged when someone besides me attempts to define me. I'm in control of who I am, not anyone else.

Answers will vary. Lead students to understand that our identities are so very personal. They often feel like literal parts of who we are. Making any sort of change to them feels weird, scary, unfamiliar, and difficult.



- When we let go and let God take full control of our lives, we will lose certain things, but we'll find that this loss actually equals gain. (More on this in the wrapping-up activity.)

- What are some examples of "losses" that you (or other teenagers) might experience because of strongly identifying with Jesus?


SESSION 2
