Discomfort. It's the opposite of being comfortable. And each of the things listed up above cause most of us a certain level of discomfort.

#### Let's add one more:

#### ENGAGING IN CONVERSATIONS ABOUT OUR FAITH.

Why does talking about our faith with people make us so uncomfortable? Actually, that's not a great question, is it? Talking about issues as serious and meaningful as Jesus, our sin, and the sacrifice of His life to provide us the only way for probably should be a little uncomfortable, right?

Maybe the better question is why we let this discomfort keep us from doing it. Because if you're honest, feeling uncomfortable is what keeps you from having meaningful discussions about the Gospel with your family, friends, and other people you meet. The big problem with this is that you are God's plan to share Jesus' message of forgiveness, hope, wholeness, and eternal life. That's right—You!

If you have been saved by exchanging death for life through placing your faith in Jesus, you are part of the Church (followers of Jesus). And the Church is God's Plan A to bring the Gospel to the entire world.

Consider this your call. Jesus has called you to this mission because this is His expectation for all who follow Him. Don't believe it? Don't worry. We're about to clear all that up.

But before you can respond to Jesus' command to go and make disciples, you have to be willing to *Exchange* your fear of embarrassment, your avoidance of self-sacrifice, and the urge to minimize your own discomfort for something much greater—Jesus' call to impact the world in His name.

Get ready to uncover the final  $\ensuremath{\textit{Exchange}}$  in this study. It's a good one . . .



He did this so that "by all means," he might lead some of them to a saving relationship with God. In Paul's words, "I do it all for the sake of the Gospel."

   Answers will vary. Paul was not one of the original disciples who heard Jesus' call that day. However, as a follower of Jesus, he understood that he
  must live out Jesus' call to "Go! Make disciples!" including sharing the Gospel with all to whom it was possible—come what may.
- The Greek word Paul uses for ashamed means "to be disgraced, embarrassed, or personally humiliated." Can you think of times or situations where you are tempted to be embarrassed because of your faith?
- If you replace the words "your faith" in the previous question with the word "Jesus," does it change things for you?

  Answers will vary. Help guide students to feel the weight of the difference.
- Why do you think Paul wasn't ashamed of the Gospel?

  | Paul tips his hand. He believed the Gospel contained the power of God for salvation for all who believe." Paul saw the Gospel as bringing life (abundant life to the full), and he did not want anyone to miss out and experience elemal separation from God.

# AND SO YOUR IMMERSION IN EXCHANGE HAS COME TO AN CLOSE . . .

We started this journey together with a simple question that led us to what seemed like a simple definition—defining an *Exchange* as swapping "this" for "that."
