ABOUT THIS WEEK

This week we learned that Jesus didn't just bring light into the world — He shares that light with us. When we follow Him, we don't only see the light; we *carry* it. Jesus says we are the light of the world, which means our lives can help others see God's love, hope, and truth more clearly.

- Last week we challenged one another to invite the light of Jesus into dark parts of our lives. How did that go? Does anyone want to share?
- What's the biggest difference between a light that's "hidden" and one that's impossible to ignore?
- If someone described your personality as a "type of light" (spotlight, campfire, lantern, LED strip, headlights), what would it be and why?
- When's a time someone else's kindness or encouragement brought light into *your* day?

Discussion Questions:

- When Jesus says "you are the light of the world," what responsibility is He giving His followers?
- Why do you think Jesus warns against hiding your light? What does "hiding" look like for high school students today?
- Jesus says our good deeds should help people "glorify your Father in heaven."
- What makes a good deed point to God instead of pointing back to us?
- Read 1 John 1:5 "God is light; in Him there is no darkness at all." How does reflecting God's light shape your identity? Your relationships? Your choices?
- Where do you see darkness in your school, friendships, or social spaces? How might Jesus be inviting you to shine there?

• Think of one situation this past week where you *dimmed* your light or hid your faith. What could it look like to respond differently next time?
